STARR Family Lore

- John STARR served as an infantry Captain in the Parliamentary Army
- After the war he settled in Ulster, Ireland
- His son John had 9 children
- Including 6 sons 5 of whom immigrated to Pennsylvania
- The STARR family were Quakers

Benton County, Oregon

Bellfountain

H. L. Mack informs us that he lived in Bellfountain for 13 years. The town was named for the place of the same name in Ohio by local residents who had previously lived in the Ohio town.

Bellfountain Settlement

Pioneer center of Methodism and camp meetings in the upper Willamette Valley, this community of settlers arrived in 1847, included particularly the Belknaps and Starrs. All of the early day circuit riders of the denomination preached here. ..."



There could be three Methodist ministers by the name of Starr who lived in Benton County and rode the circuit.

On April 4th 1853 the Moses Starr family started on the long and perilous journey across the plains.

Ox and horse teams made this trip possible, like all great land migrations.

On August 23rd they arrived at the Umatilla Indian Agency about 150 miles east of The Dalles. They signed the register. "Starr, M. w, 5 s, 1 d" Records were only taken for 1853 & '54.

When they reached The Dalles, Moses was taken ill and soon after reaching Clackamas he died.

Saddened though she was, Elizabeth took his place and led the little band on to their destination in Benton County, where she took up a Donation Land Claim.

Both Moses and Elizabeth Starr are buried in the Alpine Cemetery, Benton County, Oregon.

Quakers in Decline - Marrying Out

Ouaker meetings in Pennsylvania disowned about 22% of its 1760 membership between 1755 & 1776. In Philadelphia Monthly Meeting the number one reason for disciplinary cases from 1682 to 1776 was:

Marrying contrary to discipline

Chester County, Pennsylvania

Quakers as Emigrants

Quakers were not indentured servants or prisoners. Friends brought their servants, many of whom were Quakers. They also paid their own passage:

- Master or servant £5
- Children under 10 yrs 50s (£2 10s)
- Babes in arms Nothing


May 1840 - by Keturah Penton Belknap

It is now May and the sheep are sheared and the wool must be washed and packed and got off to the carding machines. So my summer's work is before me. ...

George and I are going to take a vacation and go about 10 miles away to a camp meeting. There are 4 young men and two girls going with us but I made them promise that there should be no sparking and they should all be in their proper places in time for service ...

Around the tent we were like one family but we were the head. This was the first camp meeting west of the Mississippi as far as I know. People came from far and near and I think there were about twenty clear conversions.

Both of the girls were married to two of the young men in the fall and lived to raise families who made good, useful men and women in church and state. Samuel F Starr married Cumie Belknap ... Cephas W Starr and Noah Starr were the other two men.



January 31st A.D. 1845

Dear Son: [James Starr, 1807-1866, oldest child by 1st wife]

I now take my pen to inform you that we are enjoying good health except Isaac R. ... Your mother also has been sick for a few days but is better, ...

We think this country [lowa] to be as healthy as Ohio with as good soil there is in any country and a good climate. This is going to be a powerful state. It has more than doubled in population in 2 years past ... We have but few of the low class which is generally found in new countries.

C.W. Starr wrote to us from Ohio and said in his letter ... that you had lost 2 of your children which is a great affliction indeed and we sympathize with you.

Your brothers John W., Wm. F., and Jabez Starr are all living in this country and are well pleased. Your brothers Samuel F. and Noah A. Starr are teaching school.

In C.W. Starr's letter he stated that Moses had thoughts about coming to Iowa ... If he should come, let him bring no stock and come by water to Keockuck Iowa Territory, then 65 or 60 miles up the river to the Des Moines. He will find us and we will move him up.

My heart is full and so is my paper. ... your affectionate father and mother.

Moses and Elizabeth Starr

Belmont County, Ohio

Welsey Chapel Cemetery, Smith TWN NW of Centerville

A Methodist church was organized in this are about 1810 at the home of James Starr and the first log church erected about 1812. Four churches have been erected in this site but none is there now. Among the members were the Starrs, Lucases, Pryors and Weekleys.

James Starr (1758 - 1822)

- Son of Moses Starr (1720-1794?)
- In Revolutionary War enlisted Cumberland
 Co, PA Bounty Land Claim & in DAR
- Maybe in Allegheny Co, Maryland before Hampshire Co, VA (adjacent counties)
- Married 1787 Hampshire Co, (West) VA
- Justice of the Peace Belmont Co, OH
- In Belmont as early as 1802/03; 1810 Census
- Methodist Minister

Moses Starr (1720 – 1794?)

1745 Married - Sarah Davis (Quaker)

- No Issue
- Marriage Dissolved

abt 1754 Married - Anna Margeretha Quattlebaum

- Dismissed from Society of Friends at Gwynedd Meeting for "Disunity" in 20 Sept 1754
- Moses and Anna Margaret had 9 children

- Q. Where was the Ballyhaise Meeting?
 - Not in the town of Belturbet
 - Not in the town of Ballyhaise
 - Not in the Castleterra Parish
- A. In Annagh Parish, closer to Ballyhaise than Belturbet.

Key to Irish Quakers --- "Suffering" Records

 1679, Ulster, County Antrim: John Starr and William Haddock, of Parish of Magheragall, suffered persecution for tithes.

- Robart sone to Robart Starr buried the xxiiij of October 1640
- Epriam son of James Star of Magherigall, Jan the 21st 1673
- John son of John Star of Lisburne, Jann the 29th 1673
- Robert son of James Star of Magherigall, April the 22nd 1677
